United Way continues to work hard to meet the pressing social needs of our community and fulfill our vision of improving the quality of life for everyone in our local community.

In 2016, despite challenges in some of our workplace campaigns, including labour unrest, workplace closures and economic struggles in some sectors, as well as an increasingly competitive marketplace, our generous community once again came together to raise a record \$3.62 million. These funds enable us to continue to provide stable funding for our funded agencies, as well as help out in emergency situations or with emerging needs.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our volunteers who donated their time and energy to run workplace campaigns. Our success is due, in large part, to these dedicated volunteers and their generous community spirit! Without them, there would be no way!

We also thank our Board of Directors, Campaign Cabinet, committee members and staff, who not only ensure that dollars are raised, but that they are invested where they can do the most good in the community.

The success of the 2016 campaign has made it possible for United Way to invest in 90 social service programs at 55 local agencies in the City of Guelph and Wellington and Dufferin counties. We truly appreciate the passion of our agency partners, their dedication and service, often in very difficult circumstances, and how much our community benefits from their commitment.

As we look forward to 2017, we are excited about new opportunities and the chance to grow our commitment to the community. 2016 saw our largest workplace campaigns ever, and we are working hard to continue that success by building new community partnerships. We continue to look for new ways to engage donors and program users, and in 2016, began work in partnership with United Way Cambridge & North Dumfries (now United Way Waterloo Region Communities) to work on our Community Investment strategy. Our United Way held community consultations in an effort to identify themes and outcomes within the United Way Focus Areas to identify which areas of work and current impact were most relevant and meaningful to all of our stakeholders. This will lead us to develop a credible plan for how United Way can combine funding, public awareness and

participation to make a difference on the issues the community cares about. A report will be released July 2017 outlining the process and results of these consultations.

In closing, we thank all of you for your commitment to United Way. With your support, United Way will continue to fund local programs that move people from poverty to possibility, that create strong communities, and that help kids be all that they can be. Thanks to you, we are making change start here.

# **Community Investment**



Community Impact is about achieving meaningful, long-term improvements to quality of life in Guelph Wellington and Dufferin communities by addressing not just the symptoms of problems but also getting at the root causes. Recognizing this, United Way Guelph Wellington Dufferin chooses to focus efforts in three key community investment Focus Areas essential for our community to thrive. We do this by investing in programs and by working closely with local community groups – those that receive United Way funds and those that do not – to address the social needs of individuals and groups in our community that are vulnerable to social and systemic barriers to create meaningful change.

Over the past 20 years, the annual United Way campaign has raised more than \$52.5 million to support social service and voluntary-sector programs in Guelph, Wellington and Dufferin. With more than 1,100 volunteers taking part in the campaign annually, this is truly a community achievement.


Under the leadership of Campaign Chair Rick McCombie and the campaign cabinet, the 12 week campaign in the fall of 2016 saw 250 workplaces run campaigns. Volunteers in each workplace collected pledge forms, ran special events and shared the message of the positive changes United Way makes possible in the community. Many more in the community gave through mail or online options, or participated in one of United Way's events, such as the golf tournament or Starlight Film Festival.

# Accountability

- We are a member of and adhere to Imagine Canada's Ethical Code and Donor Bill of Rights
- Our financial statements are audited by an independent auditor and are available online at unitedwayguelph.com
- United Way actively solicits in-kind donations, sponsorships, pro-bono services, loaned staff and the support of volunteers to keep expenses as low as possible. This ensures that as much as possible of every dollar raised goes directly to the local community.

# **Audited Statements**

In our audited financial statements for 2016, revenue and expenses are stated in three areas of operation—campaign (including program funding), community services (community investment) and building and capital, and then as a combined total. Overall, the audit shows the organization is on sound financial footing, and that the financial practices at United Way are in accordance with Canadian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles.

Of United Way's three areas of operation, campaign represents the largest portion, and as such, additional details related to the campaign/community investment component of the audit are provided.
