


Fund Allocation by Focus Area

Early Start Family Literacy

Allocation: \$18,000

The Early Start Family Literacy program targets parents/caregivers and children ages 0 to 6, and includes hands-on activities that teach adults about how children learn and helps families discover learning opportunities in everyday routines. The program helps children develop early literacy and numeracy skills, get comfortable in social settings and make successful transitions into formal education.

Educational Supports for Disadvantaged Adults

Allocation: \$45,140

The Educational Supports for Disadvantaged Adults program improves skills in the areas of reading, writing, numeracy, verbal communication, working with others and computer use for individuals who experience a wide range of significant barriers and learning challenges. This program helps build and develop the skills and competencies of individuals to achieve their personal goals for employment, further education, training and independence.

Rural Outreach Services

Allocation: \$10,000

The Rural Outreach Services program is implemented to address the isolation associated with Alzheimer's disease or dementia, while enhancing and broadening access to specialized services (such as group education meetings, caregiver support groups and individual counselling services) in the rural Wellington County area. The program seeks to create more opportunities to empower individuals living with dementia and their care partners to better define quality of life for themselves after diagnosis, to reduce stereotypes and to improve access to available resources.

HIV/AIDS Prevention & Support Program

Allocation: \$25,000

The HIV/AIDS Prevention & Support Program is designed to provide confidential counselling and practical support to individuals and families who are affected by or at risk of HIV/AIDS. Compassionate support and accurate information to assist people affected by HIV/AIDS is provided to help in managing their health and making informed decisions, improving quality of life and well-being.

Summer Funding Program

Allocation: \$14,000

The Summer Funding program provides subsidies for families to send their children with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) to a summer program or to have a one-on-one worker for their child in order for them to partake in camp activities. It gives caretakers a much needed break and allows children with autism to engage in socialization. Additionally, it gives the siblings of the ASD children the much needed one-on-one time with their caregivers, since their focus is usually mainly on the ASD child due to their special needs.

Match Program

Allocation: \$12,000

The Match Program provides friendship and guidance to children and youth aged 5-18, who need support in their lives from a positive adult. In this program, children who spend time with a mentor gain confidence, acquire new skills and interests, and develop an enhanced capacity to care for others. Big/Little time together may be weekly or bi-weekly and involves a wide range of activities depending on their interests.

Match Program

Allocation: \$12,500

The Match program pairs a child with a Big Brother or Big Sister. The child benefits immensely from regular weekly meetings that build self-esteem and trust. Through this relationship of friendship and positive role modeling, the mentor reduces the emotional distress of the child and guides the child to make more positive life choices. In many cases, this relationship allows the child to navigate their way out of poverty and into a life with greater opportunities.

In-School Mentoring

Allocation: \$5,000

The In-School Mentoring program matches children with a caring adult mentor for one hour each week, right at their school. By spending one-on-one time, the program encourages friendships and builds self-esteem through activities such as crafts, games and sports.

Big Bunch Group Program

Allocation: \$24,722

The Big Bunch Program provides services to boys and girls who are waiting to be matched with their Big Brother or Big Sister. It also serves those children who would benefit from a positive male or female role model and peer interaction with other children.

In-School Mentoring Program

Allocation: \$11,400

The In-School Mentoring Program provides children at local schools with a positive adult role model. Each child is matched 1-1 to a mentor with similar interests and a compatible personality. The match then participates in mutually enjoyable and interesting activities for one hour per week during school hours and on school property.

Match Program

Allocation: \$69,312

The Match Program provides children with a role model and a friend to talk to and share the experiences of growing up. Through regular outings, a relationship is developed, built on trust and common interests.

School-Based Group Programs

Allocation: \$15,000

The Go Girls! program is a group mentoring program for girls aged 12-14 that focuses on physical activity, balanced eating and creating positive self-esteem. The single, most important goal of the program is to positively shape the lives of young women and girls by helping them build a positive self-image and setting them on a path to reach their full potential in life. Game On! is a group mentoring program providing boys and young men with information and support to make informed choices about a range of healthy lifestyle practices. Through non-traditional physical activities, complemented with healthy eating support, participants are engaged in life skills, communication, and emotional health discussions designed to engage participants in the pursuit of life-long healthy lifestyles. The Play On! Program is a unique program, providing the same services as the Go Girls! Program, but is directed at girls in Grades 5 and 6.

Go Girls and Game On

Allocation: \$3,000

The Go Girls and Game On programs are group programs for girls and boys in Grade 7 & 8 that operate for 7 weeks. The participants learn new life skills and information in the area of physical activities, healthy eating and self-esteem. The Game On program provides information and supports to boys and young men to make informed choices about a range of life-long healthy lifestyle practices. In the Go Girls program, the participants are also informed about making healthy choices and by conveying the message that being active can still be fun. As a result, the girls become equipped to incorporate these values into their lives.

In-School Mentoring Program

Allocation: \$4,000

The In-School Mentoring Program matches children with a caring adult mentor for one hour each week, right at their school. By spending one-on-one time, the program encourages friendships and building self-esteem through multiple activities. The program strives to provide a role model and a friend for at risk girls and boys; promote the importance of staying in school and healthy relationships with family and peers; instill trust and self-confidence in order to make healthy decisions; encourage leadership skills and independent thinking; and above all, make a difference while having fun.

Match Program

Allocation: \$20,680

The Match Program is where a volunteer Big Brother, Big Sister or a Couple is matched to a child or youth. Each week, the Big/Little meets once per week for two to four hours. While together, they explore the community, try new activities, and learn new skills. The Big and Little build a trusting friendship together that supports the healthy development of the Little, bringing out his/her full potential. The mentoring program provides role models and mentors for at risk girls and boys. These relationships instill trust and self-confidence in the child.

Hearing Care Counselling Program

Allocation: \$7,200

The Hearing Care Counselling program provides counselling services, including home visits, education, demonstrations and recommendations of communication devices. The program helps seniors stay safely and independently at home, improves communication with family and friends and helps them stay involved in activities.

Information Services & Community Development

Allocation: \$8,600

The Information Services & Community Development program provides information to the general public on hearing health care, including prevention and accessibility. This is a proactive program designed to prevent and aid in hearing loss. The program helps to break down barriers so people can participate in the community and be independent.

Mental Health Promotion & Education Services **Allocation: \$28,180**

The Mental Health promotion and Education Services Program works to help decrease stigma and prejudice related to mental health and mental health issues. Training, workshops and awareness activities are provided that relate to understanding and responding to mental health struggles, while enhancing personal development, skills, and knowledge.

Spark of Brilliance **Allocation: \$27,210**

The Spark of Brilliance program is a community-based mental health initiative that promotes healing, recovery and discovery through the expressive arts. Workshops are open to people living with mental health and/or addiction issues and their supportive allies. The program offers creative programming in safe, nonjudgmental and welcoming environments, where adults with a lived experience of mental health and/or addictions issues are free to express themselves creatively, where the focus is not on disability, but on strengths and ability. Spark of Brilliance is helping to bust stigma, raise awareness and educate the broader community about mental health issues.

YouthTALK **Allocation: \$24,500**

The YouthTALK program is based on youth engagement principles, where youth have the support of adult mentors to learn about mental health, suicide, coping strategies and resources and create activities to share this knowledge with their peers. With the support of adult mentors in the school and the YouthTALK facilitator, the plan for youth is to create and implement activities that focus on self-care, resilience, promoting good mental health, and seeking help from trusted adults when needed.

Children & Youth Services (Beyond the Classroom) Allocation: \$12,875

The Child and Youth Services program offers one-on-one visits in the home or community to help a child, who is blind or partially sighted, and their family in order to learn skills necessary to compensate for vision loss. This may include self-care, age-appropriate cooking skills, exploration of options to participate in sports and recreational activities, encouragement of literacy skills, and instruction in use of technology. In addition to skill attainment, the visits focus on helping families to understand that a full and rewarding life is still entirely possible for their child, and on helping them to set appropriate expectations for their child.

Library Services Allocation: \$5,091

The Library Services program acquires, produces, and distributes published works in alternative formats to Canadian public libraries and provides public libraries with advice, training, and information to support their patrons' access to and use of these collections. Library patrons have access to more than 300,000 items in accessible formats including audio, braille, and electronic text. CNIB staff inform clients about the available technology and teach them how to download materials to a computer, handheld device and/or DAISY CD Player.

Vision & Rehabilitation Services Allocation: \$17,997

The Vision Rehabilitation Services consists of three main services, including Low Vision Services, Independent Living Services and Orientation and Mobility Services. The three services aid individuals to make the most of their remaining vision, to build everyday skills and confidence to live independently, and learn how to travel and navigate safely on their own.

Volunteer Services Allocation: \$10,000

The CNIB Volunteer program supports all aspects of the organization, from leadership to peer support and administration. Volunteers facilitate peer support groups that help individuals with vision loss to share their concerns, challenges and successes. Service Support Volunteers work with clients to reinforce skills taught by service specialists. Vision Mate Volunteers (in a one-to-one long term match) provide sighted assistance to a person who is blind or partially sighted. Activities may include reading, computer assistance, shopping, recreation assistance, community access, going for walks and friendly visiting.

Healthy Fresh Food Program

The Healthy Fresh Food program provides free groceries and other basic supplies (one week's supply, once a month) to low income and at-risk individuals and families in the community. Additional products including meat and dairy are also purchased (one week's supply, once a month) and available to individuals and families who use the service. This program also prepares over 350 fresh wholesome meals on a monthly basis for their clients.

Allocation: \$30,000

The Food Pantry program provides nutritious emergency food and support to members of our community. The program does not require means testing, which allows community members to access food every other week, if needed, without having to provide proof of eligibility of income. The Food Pantry is open at the Downtown location on Wednesdays and Fridays and at the West End location on Thursdays. The program serves a wide variety of individuals including youth, seniors, families, children, couples, students, low income employed, marginally housed, those struggling with mental illness and addictions, and people living with disabilities.

Child Witness Program

Allocation: \$8,750

The Child Witness Program provides support through the court process for children, youth and their families, who are victims or witnesses of crime. They are provided with information about their case and the judicial system, accompanied to court and supported through the process. During the course of the relationship with the child and the family, they are assessed to see what other supports they may require during and after the court process. The program also connects them to services in the community that meet their unique needs.

The Outreach and Support program offers community based information, resources, and supports to low-income individuals in Centre Wellington,

Food Bank

Allocation: \$22,500

East Wellington Community Services operates two foodbanks, one in Guelph/Eramosa Township and the other in the Town of Erin. The food banks provide short-term food support to families and individuals who are financially unable to meet their basic food requirements. This program helps improve the daily lives of families by providing a balanced level of nutrition, while contributing to their overall health and well-being.

Client Services

The Client Services program is the local resource which provides information and support to clients over the phone, through email or in person about health, accessible services and programs that are available in East Wellington. This program is not only a local resource for clients, it also provides the community with information and referral services that link residents to local supportive community services and community-based programs. Nurturing Neighbourhood Initiatives**Allocation: \$50,000**

The Nurturing Neighbourhood Initiative (NNI) is an active partnership between the Guelph Neighbourhood Support Coalition, Public Health, the Guelph Community Health Centre, Guelph Police, Canadian Mental Health Association, the City of Guelph and both school boards. These partners are engaged with Neighbourhood Groups in discussions about how to have a more efficient and effective impact in the most vulnerable neighbourhoods in Guelph. There are currently two projects that are part of the NNI; (1) the development of the Community Hubs project in the Brant Avenue Neighbourhood and, (2) The Parent Outreach Worker Program that connects families with the supports they need.

Financial Health & Literacy Services**Allocation: \$65,000**

The Financial Health and Literacy program provides one-on-one counselling to families and individuals burdened by financial stress/debt. Clients are provided with a non-judgmental and thorough financial assessment, where options are generated to address their financial difficulty. Budget counselling and financial literacy education is also provided, with specialized financial literacy counselling programs available to vulnerable clients such as abused women.

Subsidized Counselling Program**Allocation: \$40,664**

The Subsidized Counselling program provides short-term therapeutic counselling services to individuals, couples and families who do not have access to such services. The program’s social workers, marriage & family therapists, and master level interns are supervised by core staff with extensive training in all areas, to ensure high quality service. Clients are provided with a clear and defined assessment, treatment plan with connections to informal supports, internal programs and to other community supports in order to ensure success. This service focuses on eliminating accessibility issues faced by many due to affordability.

Walk-In Counselling Services**Allocation: \$60,978**

Walk-In Counselling Services is a unique program providing a walk-in counselling service to anyone in the community (individuals, families and couples) needing support for mental health care needs. This is a single session model providing immediate support and treatment planning. Individuals who are unable to attend the scheduled Walk-In day are accommodated by scheduling sessions at a time and date that works for them (aka Booked Walk-In). Further, FCSSGW has a group for Mood and Communication as a cost effective way to meet the top two issues identified by Walk-In clients.

Give Yourself Credit**Allocation: \$29,120**

The Give Yourself Credit program was developed collaboratively by agencies within Guelph and Wellington County to provide opportunities for at-risk youth to experience school success. The program offers youth, primarily aged 16-21, an education alternative in a community setting, with the goal of helping provide vulnerable youth the opportunity to obtain high school credits.

Allocation: \$18,000

The Garden Fresh Box program increases physical and economic access to fresh fruits and vegetables among food insecure individuals and families in Guelph and its surrounding areas. The pick-up points are strategically located in areas that have high instances of low income housing, and have poor access to healthy grocery options. The box is offered once per month, and saves customers anywhere from 24% to 48% on the cost of produce.

Anti-Bullying Program (Crime Prevention)

Allocation: \$6,000

The Anti-Bullying program is broken into three smaller programs. The primary program fosters development in social competency such as self-monitoring, appropriate problem solving, and knowing when to seek help and recognizing passive, aggressive and assertive choices. The junior level program takes a more in-depth look at bullying situations and the players involved (the person who chooses to bully, the person who was targeted and the bystanders). Students discuss the decision that each individual could make and the ramifications of those choices. Social competencies are explored as they apply specifically to a bullying situation (i.e. students are taught to be assertive through the use of a strategy specifically designed to combat bullying). A final session also introduces concepts of cyber safety/responsibility and cyberbullying. Each of the programs are completed within school classrooms throughout the scheduled school day.

Community Aftercare

The Community Aftercare program serves adults who have previously offended and/or been incarcerated, and provides them with counselling and community integration supports leading to personal well-being and preventing recidivism.
