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United Way Impact Areas

United Way works closely alongside issue experts on research planning tables to understand our community's needs and facilitate investment in programs through a volunteer Community Impact Committee. United Way has identified five essential building blocks to create strong neighbourhoods and thriving communities, including:

Connected Kids

All children and youth should believe in themselves and feel like they are a part of the community in which they live. When they feel a sense of belonging and pride in their communities, they are better able to deal with life challenges and get involved. Children who participate in activities are more likely to have higher self-esteem, develop skills for learning and form positive relationships.

Adequate Basic Needs

Basic needs include food, housing and income. These are crucial social determinants of health that individuals and families need to survive and thrive.

Sense of Belonging

Feeling a sense of belonging and participating in your community benefits individuals, organizations and communities alike. People who are connected to others and their community tend to be happier and healthier. Belonging and participating are ways to get emotional support, feel valued, decrease social isolation and give back to the community.

Positive Mental Health

Positive mental health means people can handle life's challenges. Mental health, poverty and overall well-being are connected. People who struggle with mental illness are more likely to have chronic illnesses. A mental illness can impact a person's ability to pursue education, or to find employment.

Supports for Seniors

Social networks provide social, emotional and financial support to individuals, while connecting them to other groups, people and opportunities. Social participation affects physical and mental health and is especially important for older adults. Health benefits include better quality of life, living longer and a decreased risk of acquiring a disability, depression, anxiety or dementia.

Early Start Family Literacy

Allocation: \$18,000

The Early Start Family Literacy program targets parents/caregivers and children ages 0 to 6. It includes hands-on activities that teach adults about how children learn and helps families discover learning opportunities in everyday routines. The program helps children develop early literacy and numeracy skills, get comfortable in social settings and make successful transitions into formal education.

The Summer Funding program provides subsidies to families with children/youth with autism so that they can attend summer programs (e.g. camps) with the supports they need to learn new skills and participate in social activities.

Match Program

Allocation: \$15,000

The Match program matches children with a Big Brother or Big Sister. The child benefits from regular weekly meetings that build self-esteem and trust. Through this relationship of friendship and positive role modeling the mentor reduces the emotional distress of the child and guides the child to make more positive life

choices. In many cases, this relationship allows the child to navigate their way out of poverty and into a life with greater opportunity.

In-School Mentoring

Allocation: \$5,000

The In-School Mentoring Program matches children with a caring adult mentor for one hour each week, right at their school. The children are chosen for the program by staff at the school. The children are struggling in some way at school and could benefit from time spent with a mentor. Through one-on-one visits, the program encourages friendships and builds self-esteem through activities such as crafts, games and sports.

Big Bunch Group Program

Allocation: \$20,721

The Big Bunch program provides service to boys and girls who are on the waiting list for their own Big Brother or Big Sister. It also serves those children who need a positive male or female role model and peer interaction with other children of a similar age and same gender. Each group has a designated leader and several other dedicated volunteers who are assigned a number of girls or boys within a specific age range. The volunteers plan and supervise at least 2 outings each month, picking up the children and driving them to their group outings. All group leaders have been fully screened, trained and approved according to national standards laid out by Big Brothers Big Sisters of Canada as well as local agency standards and policies.

One to One Community Match Program

Allocation: \$32,777

The One to One Mentoring program covers three programs. The Big Brother Mentoring program provides boys and young men with a role model and a good friend to talk to and share experiences of growing up. The Big Sisters Mentoring program provides girls and young women with a role model and a friend to talk to and share experiences of growing up. The Couples for Kids Mentoring program matches two adults in a committed relationship with a boy for a few hours each week over a minimum of 18 months. They share fun activities which provide positive guidance, support and role modeling to their Little Brother. All three programs strive to promote the importance of staying in school and healthy relationships with family and peers, instill trust and self-confidence in order to make healthy decisions, encourage leadership skills and independent thinking and above all, make a difference while having fun.

In-School Mentoring Program Allocation: \$35,000

The In-School Mentoring program provides girls and boys with a role model and a friend to talk to and share the experiences of growing up within school grounds. For one hour a week, mentors meet with their mentee and engage in activities such as board games, crafts or just hang out in the playground. Big Brothers Big Sisters of Guelph, in partnership with the Upper Grand District School Board and the Wellington Catholic District School Board, provides co-op placements in the In-School Mentoring program where the agency matches high school students completing a cooperative school placement with 8 mentees that they mentor throughout a high school term. Each high school student is placed at a partnering elementary school for the morning or afternoon and he/she mentors two children each day.

School-Based Mentoring**Allocation: \$24,000**

The School Based Mentoring program covers three separate programs.

"Go Girls, Healthy Bodies, Healthy Minds" is a group mentoring program for girls ages 12-14 that focuses on physical activity, balanced eating and self-esteem. The single, most important goal of the program is to positively shape the lives of young women and girls by helping them build a positive self-image and setting them on a path to reach their full potential in life. The Go Girls! program consists of 7 mentoring sessions, held over a 7-week period, within school facilities. "Game On! Eat Smart - Play Smart - Live Smart" is a group mentoring program providing boys and young men with information and support to make informed choices about a range of healthy lifestyle practices. Through non-traditional physical activities, complemented with healthy eating support, participants are engaged in life skills, communication, and emotional health discussions designed to engage participants in the pursuit of life-long healthy lifestyles. Play On! is a pre-teen program for girls and is unique to Guelph. Play On! provides the same services as the Go Girls! program, but is preventive in nature, directed towards girls in grades 5 and 6. The program focuses on encouraging and enabling girls to choose a healthy, active lifestyle.

Go Girls and Game On**Allocation: \$3,000**

Go Girls is a mentoring program designed to encourage physical activity, healthy eating choices and the development of a positive self-image among girls and young women between the ages of 12 and 14. Game On is a mentoring program that

provides boys between the ages of 12 and 14 with information and support to make informed choices about a range of healthy lifestyle practices. Both programs are seven-sessions in length, led by volunteer mentors. The main goals of these programs are to develop an appreciation of the benefits of an active and healthy life.

In-School Mentoring Program

Allocation: \$4,000

The In School Mentoring program provides girls and boys in public school with a role model and a friend to talk to and share experiences of growing up, within school grounds. For one hour a week, volunteer mentors meet with their mentee and engage in activities such as board games, crafts or just hang out in the playground. The program requires a weekly visit of 1 hour for the duration of the school year. The program strives to provide a role model and a friend for girls and boys; promote the importance of staying in school and healthy relationships with family and peers; instill trust and self-confidence in order to make healthy decisions; encourage leadership skills and independent thinking; and above all, make a difference while having fun.

One to One Mentoring

Allocation: \$20,680

The One to One Match program is for children/youth between the ages of 6 and 18 who reside in the north part of Wellington County. This program pairs children/youth with a screened and trained mentor of the same gender for a safe mentoring relationship. Once matched, they get together once per week for activities which develop a trusting relationship. The relationship promotes the importance of staying in school and building healthy relationships with family and peers. It instills trust and self-confidence in order for children to make healthy decisions and encourages leadership skills and independent thinking. Abuse prevention is an important part of the organization's work with children. Children who are matched develop a high self-esteem which contributes to the development of responsible and productive citizens.

GLOW (LGBTQ Youth Group)

Allocation: \$3,500

The GLOW program hosts a weekly drop-in night for LGBTQ youth, between the ages of 14-21 years. A safe, positive space is provided, where youth can express themselves, discuss topics of interest, enjoy social activities, and develop leadership and advocacy skills. They work to help young LGBTQ youth to support each other in an anti-oppressive, non-judgmental atmosphere where they can be out with each other and support one another as they grow into adulthood. In the fall of 2017, the LGBTQ youth group decided to name this long standing support group “GLOW” (Gay, Lesbian OR Whatever).

Bullying Prevention/ Social Competency Program

The Bullying Prevention/Social Competency program is a school-based program to increase knowledge and foster development in social competency such as self-monitoring, appropriate problem solving, knowing when to seek help and recognizing passive, aggressive and assertive choices. The program also explores the roles of the bully, bullied and bystander and discusses choices and outcomes. Cyber-bullying and appropriate electronic communication skills are reviewed in junior and intermediate classes.

Youth Resiliency Program

The Youth Resiliency Program is designed to support vulnerable, at-risk youth in the Onward Willow/Shelldale community. The youth who participate in the programs struggle with many issues including: poverty, domestic and community violence, learning disabilities, mental health, drug addiction as well as racism and discrimination. A variety of recreational, social and educational programs that will be engaging for youth participation are offered. ReFresh: Bringing Good Food Home

Allocation: \$10,000

This program is a partnership with Bayer CropScience. HOPE House plants and seeds more than 3 acres of land on a donated farm plot. This crop is used to supply the Food Market with fresh produce throughout the summer and fall months. The farm plot is maintained using a summer student and a team of volunteers to weed

and harvest the fresh produce. Each year, more than 50,000 lbs of fresh produce is harvested, and because it cannot all be used without it going to waste, a large portion of it (more than 40%) is shared with other community service providers, including the North End Market, Chalmers, Salvation Army and the Neighbourhood Groups. This ensures that people accessing different service points throughout the city can get good-quality, farm fresh produce.

Residential Program

Allocation: \$50,000

The Residential Program is a six-bedroom home that provides shelter and support for women who are pregnant or newly-parenting and who are either homeless or living in situations that are unsafe. The goals of the program are to provide a safe environment, food and access to community supports for women pregnant or parenting a child under the age of three; to help empower the women to move forward in their goals, with a focus on life-skills, parenting and formal education; and to help women dealing with trauma, mental health issues or addictions get the help they need from community supports in order for those women to provide a safe and secure environment for their child(ren). Residents complete a detailed program addressing risk factors such as isolation, homelessness, mental health or addiction issues. The Residential Program aims to break the cycles of poverty and abuse. The goal is to keep families intact and reduce the number of children growing up in the Child Welfare system.

Supportive Transitional Housing Program

Allocation: \$10,000

The Supportive Transitional Housing Program is comprised of 8 two-bedroom apartments providing housing with support to mothers and their children who require a safe and affordable place to live. The goals of the program are: to reduce the risk of homelessness or housing instability for women who are parenting on their own and have limited personal resources; to provide a stable environment for children during their formative years, and to prevent isolation and foster community supports and networks for the young family. The program is designed to provide a safety net for mother and child at a critical time in their lives. Residents live independently in their own two-bedroom apartments complete with a kitchen and bathroom while still receiving Michael House supports and never paying more than 30% of their income. The program, with the help of a dedicated support worker, will develop their strengths and resources to address issues that may prevent them from providing a stable and secure environment for their

children. This process will include regular check-ins to evaluate goals, progress, and concerns, all in a comfortable, home-like setting full of bright communal spaces where moms and babies can enjoy the company of other young families.

Drop-In Centre

Allocation: \$90,000

The Drop-In Centre provides access to food, shelter and a connection to resources that will improve an individual's quality of life as defined by that individual. People who live in poverty often experience food insecurity and social isolation. The Drop-In Centre is open every day of the year, including holidays, from 8 am - 3 pm for individuals who may otherwise be isolated to come together and have a meal. Individuals and families are helped to access shelter if they find themselves homeless and support is given to people to stay housed if they are going through a situational crisis that threatens their housing stability. This support can be done financially or with support and advocacy with staff.
